This was to allow the Pre-School parents and children time to get used to the new arrangements. The Village's Pre-School now uses our Church Hall for morning and afternoon sessions 5 days a week.

Although we have secured almost 100% of the funding for the

new Hall, we continue to fundraise for the time when we will be able to progress to phase 2: the linking of the Hall to Church. COUNCIL NEWS

Our last article in the last newsletter, mentioned the Council were going to run a competition for the Primary schools to design a festive light feature for display this Christmas in the town square. Unfortunately, the committee responsible having reviewed the proposal did not feel there was adequate time to co-ordinate with the schools and been deferred until next year.

David Heseltine Conservative Ward Councillor for Bingley, now a resident of Eldwick, gave a presentation to the Town Council of role as chair of Shipley Area Committee, which also includes Bingley and Bingley Rural. Various activities are devolved to this committee, Highways, Cleansing Youth Services, Parks, Grass Cutting, trees; weed spraying, cemeteries and Toilets. The cost of these operations are in the region of some £2 million.

An update on the Station adoption programme for Bingley and Crossflatts. If anyone is interested in joining the group, please come along to our next meeting at the Scouts HQ on Sycamore Avenue on 19th September commencing at 7.30pm.

As previously mentioned at the end of this financial year the public toilets will be closed in Bingley. Clearly, there is a big challenge for Bingley Town Council to keep them operational given the high running costs versus low income. However, Bingley Town Council are exploring options to keep them open.

Bradford Council are to reduce the number of roads gritted during snowy and frosty weather, to save money. Bingley Town Council have undertaken an exercise to review the route affected and are in dialogue with Bradford to ensure that we have the roads in the Bingley area adequately gritted. As part of the exercise, we have reviewed the number of grit bins available in the area, a number of additional bins have been identified, and these will be purchased to be available before the winter sets in. All grit bins will replenished where necessary by Bradford Council's highways department.

No doubt when you have been in Bingley, you will have noticed that the town clock is up and running. This is thanks to Andrew Quarrie a local Bingley resident; he liaised with the owner of the building and agreed to share the costs to get the clock operational. Individuals and organisations, Bingley Civic

Trust, Rotary and Eldwick Village Society have supported Andrew in contributing towards the costs. Andrew is still looking for contributions, he still needs £350 if anyone would like to make a personal donation please contact Andrew on 07929 167028 or 01274 776117

Bradford have given the green light to Bingley developing a Neighbourhood Plan, this will involve all members of the community. Once the plan is developed and approved, it will help to shape the future of Bingley and District. To help with the plan Bingley Town Council have appointed a consultant, Andrew Towlerton, he has worked with many councils in developing their plans. Bingley Town Council Planning Committee have been tasked with developing the plan, at the next planning meeting the committee will agree the terms of reference and the chair for leading the development of the neighbourhood plan.



THE HERITAGE OF ELDWICK

After the 2nd World War 'born from destruction' - extensive bombing, the Town and Country Planning Act of 1947 was passed to establish a listing system to protect England's extraordinary buildings, parks, and single features. Celebrating 70 years of protection, Historic England (formerly English Heritage) in August, new listings were published, in which was the Eldwick War Memorial. Following representations in an application to add the village's special structure to the List of Buildings of Special Architectural and Historic interest an assessment was made by Historic England. Notification was given on 24th August that, having taken the recommendation of Historic England, the Secretary of State for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport had decided to add Eldwick Memorial War Memorial to the list, now listed as at Grade II. Of the 400,000 entries on the list there are 234 in the Bingley locality and perhaps the Eldwick addition became the 234th. Readers will recall details of the movement to establish a suitable memorial for those Eldwick men who gave their lives during the two world wars, in a previous Eldwick Newsletter. Much of the content of that article appears in the Eldwick War Memorial List Entry Summary, which describes how the First World War Memorial of 1922, built by Mr Wildman of Eldwick, with incised lettering, was augmented by two bronze plaques to commemorate those lost in the Second World War. The structure is Sandstone ashlar with a Cenotaph design. Using stone from the local Gilstead Moor quarry.

Further details of the List entry Description states that, "Eldwick war memorial architecturally has a memorial design "consists of a square shaft with carved corners and a shallow stepped base.

Surmounting the shaft is a comice and a cap designed as a miniature obelisk with an incised cross set upon a carved base adorned with a carved relief of a laurel wreath". In Reasons for Delegation Eldwick war memorial is listed at Grade II for both historic and architectural interests. In the former it is stated that the memorial has strong cultural and historical significance...an eloquent witness to the impact of tragic world events on this local community. The Architectural Interest is stated as a distinguished and elegant cenotaph design and a good example of a wayside memorial. So, as List entry Number: 1447944, the village today should recognise with gratitude all those who, almost a century ago, were involved and responsible for this fine memorial later to become acknowledged as part of local and national heritage. Selected Sources include the website of War Memorials Online, Eldwick Conservation Area Assessment 2009, local newspaper articles and Eldwick A Village Oft Removed by Allan Mirfield 2003.

Of course, within the Eldwick locality as part of the entries in the List of Historic England there are over twenty other sites recognised. One could almost put the point of a compass on a map showing the Eldwick Beck hamlet and draw a circle to include all those other entries scattered around the outlying countryside. All date between the 17th and 19th centuries with the possibility of 16th century origins in some structures as well as, in one case, a location attributed to the 12th and 13th acquisitions of the monastic Rievaulx Abbey. In essence, all the sites tell of social history from the manor house to the almshouses and from the farming community to the people's park. Thus Eldwick was once very much of a rural nature with tended fields and moorland, within which was early industry dependent on water and mineral resources - wool and So, in alphabetical order Eldwick's Grade II properties are Ash House with barrel vaulted cellar from solid rock, Birch Close (p), Cropper Fold, Eldwick Beck cottages, Cragg Chapel, Eldwick Hall (p)3 entries, Faweather Grange (cellar p)4 entries, Hill Top Farm, Knapley Ing (p), Low House (p), Moorland Grange, Prince of Wales Park, Spring Farm and Toils (Middle) Farm. Happily many have sympathetically restored and more Eldwick farms of a similar age are not listed. NB: pictures are in same order as list, see local map for identifying locations.
