I write with reference to John Dekker's letter on the possible relocation of the War Memorial at the junction of Saltaire Road and Otley Road.

In my view there is absolutely no good reason to move the Memorial from it's present site. It is in a prominent location and visible to persons passing whether in cars, walking or riding. On Remembrance Sunday we walked down from the Church to the Memorial for the short service and laying of wreaths. The traffic was indeed held up and the lack of noise I am sure appreciated by all who attended. Almost any other site would not be as prominent and would probably not require the traffic to be halted which would leave the service subject to the noise of the **Rupert Behrendt** passing vehicles.

BINGLEY TOWN COUNCIL NEWS

The Christmas Light switch on in Bingley was a great success, it was fantastic to see the number of people who attended, we trust everyone enjoyed the improved light display - more to come next year.

You are probably all aware that Bingley Town Council are looking to retain the public toilets in Bingley that Bradford are going to close at the end of March 2018. We recently held a consultation, on Saturday 2nd December at Cardigan House for members of the public to review the proposed plans and comment accordingly whether to retain or close completely.

If you were unable to attend or missed the public meeting, you can still have your say by going on Bingley Town Council's web site. Here you can view the

public consultation documents download a copy of the survey at http://bingleytowncouncil.gov.uk/documents or pick up a hard copy version at Bingley Library or Cottingley Cornerstone Centre. Please ensure your completed returned by surveys are 31st December 2017; this will give us an overview of the communities' thoughts on whether to retain the toilets or not.

The intention, if we get the nod of approval from the community, is to retain a couple of toilets, for ladies and gents with baby changing facilities, the balance of the building will be converted into offices and storage for council property.

Bradford Council will give us the Toilet block on a long-term lease for a peppercorn rent; however, there will be significant costs to convert the building

into offices and to relocate the toilets. Bingley Town Council can borrow the required amount of money over a term of 20 years. To repay the loan we will have to increase the Precept by a small amount to cover the additional long-term costs.

The Market in the town square is gradually fading away with only 2/3 traders using the market on a Friday and one on a Saturday. However, we are looking at ways of re-igniting the Market. Following a recent meeting held between Bingley Town Councillors and interested members of the public, it was agreed to look at holding six bi-monthly markets on a Saturday, possibly April to September. As you may be aware Bingley, and Eldwick in particular, suffered an upsurge in house and car related crime over the summer months. Due to sterling efforts by local Police a number of suspects are now experiencing Her Majesty's pleasure! However, with the much publicised cuts to Police numbers, this raises the question of what the public can do to help the Police, and themselves, to alleviate such problems. One well known, and proven successful, solution is for residents to set up Neighbourhood Watch (NHW) groups.

NHW is simply about looking out for each other, sharing crime prevention advice and reporting and encouraging others to report any suspicious incidents or crimes. If you are interested in setting up a Neighbourhood Watch scheme in your area, please e-mail:

CHRISTMAS FESTIVITIES

Christmas Day in the School-Room 1835. Messrs Greenwood of Keighley had a school-room at Vale Mill, a cotton factory near Haworth, "to celebrate the establishment, principles and benefits of the Temperance Society". In the afternoon at 3 o'clock the party began with everyone sitting down for tea and were supplied plentifully with "the healthinspiring viands".

The female mill-workers themselves had decorated the room with flowers, evergreens and paintings. In the evening the public meeting started at 5 o'clock "crowded to the outside of the door" with people from Keighley, Harden, Wilsden, Haworth and Bingley. All were members of the Temperance Society and speakers were invited to speak briefly of their personal experiences. A Christmas hymn was sung and prayers offered before the first speaker, Matthew Mitchell stood forward. He explained how once he had been a drunkard, living in a cellar, sleeping on a door covered in wood shavings and his family had nothing to sit on. All that changed when the Society showed him the way to escape so he could find work in the factory and keep his family in good health.

In Eldwick at Broadstones at the foot of Sheriff Lane Mr Denby for a time ran the place as a Temperance Hotel until he

decided to gain a licence for alcohol for Shipley Glen trippers. Later the establishment became Eldwick's Dance and Music Hall - renamed New Scarborough.

The other local Temperance Society was in Bingley, commemorated by the 1866 Drinking Fountain in Prince of Wales Park. "Drink Thou Only Pure Water" reads the inscription. By contrast to the Haworth day, at the Bradford Workhouse on Christmas Day 1849 some 126 sat down to roast beef and plum pudding. In the afternoon children were given oranges as adults had foaming brown stout and Virginia weed. In the evening was music shared, spice cake, cheese and more ale was provided, thanks to kind-hearted and worthy gentlemen.

Similarly in 1857 on Christmas Day of the 580 inmates there were 370 sitting down in the workhouse spacious dining room. The rest, being sick and infirm, had 'good things' in several wards. The bill of fayre consisted of 375 pounds of beef, one and a half packs of flour, two loads of potatoes, ninety pounds of currants, sixty pounds of raisins, ninety pounds of sugar, half a pound of nutmegs, two pounds of allspice and two pounds of candied lemon. All this with just thirty six gallons of ale.

By the 1890's things were much

better and the proposed new mission church for Eldwick was in the process of having funds collected for its building fund and a Christmas Fayre was held at the National School. On sale were all kinds of Christmas gifts and Christmas Trees. Mr W.C.Ferrand, like the other kind hearted gentlemen of before, funded a Christmas celebration for the pupils and teachers of the Eldwick Board School in 1899. As he did in the summer at Daisy Bank in Gilstead Lane with a garden party, in the winter he held open house for the school. 63 book prizes were presented to the children, as well as a box of chocolates, an apple and an orange from Mrs Ferrand.

The real treat was provided by Mr Vincent Ferrand who gave a lantern show. Two years later on Christmas Eve at the Eldwick Wesleyan Chapel, Vincent presented another lantern show of Mr Charles Dickens' Christmas Carol. A little later Vincent had moved with the times and was giving cinematographic shows accompanied by music for villagers.

Soon everyone from around Bingley were to be able to attend The Assembly Rooms in Bingley on Christmas Day and Boxing Day. Courtesy of Mr Leo Conroy's Company there was 'an exceptional list of the best films from the cinematographic world, novelties never seen in public in Bingley before'.

MECHANICS' INSTITUTE CLOCK.—This clock has been, after many efforts, great and small, completed. The removing of the cross-bars out of the centre of the dial is a great improvement. People will now be able to tell at once what time of the day it is without stopping to sort out the pointers from the ornamental crossing. The clock has been made by Mr. Jonsthan Cryer. It is worked by water power, and is in every respect a splendid piece of workmanship. Three dials are attached to the works—one for the large hall, one for the reading-room, and one in front of the institution for the benefit of the public, which is to be illuminated in the evenings till ten o'clock, and which was so illuminated for the first time on Tuesday evening.
