
Edwick Newsletter Village Society Issue No. 479 October 2018

WHITE FLY GET YELLOW CARD

The Society staged a lively Gardeners' Question Time session in September. Our guest panel included Pat Inman, a member of the West Yorkshire Hardy Plant Society, who has worked in horticulture for over 30 years and has won silver and silver gilt medals at Chelsea; Terry Marshall, tomato expert and specialist in organic gardening with over 200 papers published; last but not least, Alan Wilson joined us from his Wharfedale retreat to chair the meeting and put in his two penn'orth as a regular winner in many classes at our Autumn Show.

We kicked off with a debate on the benefits of planting French marigolds close to tomatoes to prevent white fly infestations. The experts stressed that this is effective only if the marigolds are blooming before the tomato plants are in place. No good planting marigolds if the whitefly have already arrived – it's too late. The most favoured solution was to hang up sticky yellow cards which attract these little pests and trap them forever.

Blackspot on roses was the next problem to be tackled and the advice was to wash the plants thoroughly in December and again in March (our Hon Sec does this) and then to mulch with "Strulch" (a derivative of straw) to prevent the disease spores from infecting roses from the ground up. Strulch is quite expensive, but as it takes two years to decompose, it's good value long term.

Many audience members reported problems with mildew on flowers and vegetables, especially powdery mildew on cucumber leaves. The panel's advice was to ensure frequent watering to prevent attacks. One suggestion for treatment was sodium bicarbonate - the same stuff you use for making biscuits or deodorizing the refrigerator. To mix your own solution, add 1 tablespoon of baking soda for each gallon of water in your sprayer. (On a personal note, I find that two crushed Rennies in a gallon can work just as well).

was addressed, with the warning that the roots are particularly brittle and difficult to eradicate completely. Advice was given on suitable planting for a traffic island – asters, fritillarias and ornamental grasses were recommended, but don't stand back in the road to admire your handiwork.

With the chairman's frequent interventions regarding his own horticultural mishaps (vainly taking accidentally bisected worms to A&E for resuscitation was one) time flew and with much to think about, our capacity audience retired for tea and biscuits.

I'm sure you'll all be back at 7.30pm on Tuesday 16 October, when Martin Fish will tell us all about his Life in Horticulture ... so far. **Mike Hitchen**

ROUND THE BEND OR AT THE CREASE

The sporting prowess of Eldwick residents or native background would never be thought as being remarkable. It might be that 'people of a certain age' are most likely to be able to have knowledge of the names to follow. The inimitable Harvey Smith, famed for his two fingered salute (not akin to Churchill), in the equestrian world has been in Eldwick for decades. As only Harvey would do, bridleways have become gallops for his race horses from the riding stables.

Brian Sellers who spent the last years of his life in Eldwick, living at Parkside on Park Road, was an amateur first class cricketer who played 334 matches for Yorkshire between 1932 and 1948. He became county captain and in his ten seasons leading the team, Yorkshire won the County Championship six times, thanks also to Herbert Sutcliffe, Len Hutton, Hedley Verity, Bill Bowes and Maurice Leyland, great names of the time. He was the only Yorkshire amateur player to score a double century.

By complete contrast, of some enormity, comes the story of Frank Varey, Born in Eldwick at No 7 The Green, above The Acorn Inn. His family, when he was 3 in the 1911 Census, had this little cottage of two rooms, not including the scullery, for his father, a labourer at the Eldwick Brickworks, mother, sister Lily and brother Thomas. His father lost his life in the Great War of 1914-18 leaving Frank to look after the family. His first job in 1924 was at the Scott Motorcycle Works at Saltaire in the fitting and erecting department. Soon he was given trials for testing the bikes in trials. Then came the advent of dirt track racing or speedway as it was later to be known. Frank realised there was money to be made in this sport so he was soon competing in events, finishing a day's work then setting out for the evening meeting. The bike had to be stripped of mudguards then reassembled after the race to take Frank home. Soon the prominent club in the north of England became the Belle Vue Aces and it was for that club that Frank made his debut in the English Dirt Track League in 1929.

As a true Yorkshireman with grit and

determination, Frank was 'an uncompromising rider' to put it politely. There were scrapes with officialdom, clashes with promoters and many time encounters on the track during races. So much so that he often had the opposition crowd in such a state that a police escort was needed to get him safely away. All this made great headlines and filled stadiums to capacity.

During the winter of 1929/30 he rode in Argentina where fans there named him El Diablo Rojo – The Red Devil. He rode for England in the first ever test series versus Australia and decided to retire in 1935, only to have a change of heart to return and compete in the 1937 and 1938 World Speedway Championships. The only problem was that by that time he was also running a garage business and trying to race as well caused a dip in form at Belle Vue so the promoter persuaded Frank to sell his business.

Surprisingly the races continued during the war years and Frank became the 1944 British Wartime Champion. A year later came his final retirement when he turned his attention to promoting and developing more tracks. All the time he had been at Belle Vue the champions' trophies became a regular occurrence but when he decided to leave it became Sheffield's because gain Frank reopened the track there. He went on to promote at Edinburgh, back to Sheffield in 1960 and Belle Vue in 1974 as team manager. Still advising on a new track at Sheffield and relocating Belle Vue, Frank was seen as the ideal person to reopen the latter but sadly in 1988 it was not to be as Frank passed away only weeks before the sport returned to the Aces new venue.


It was sheer coincidence that the Varey's home of No 7 The Green, saddened by the loss of Thomas in the First World War, became, when uninhabited, the base for Eldwick's own platoon of the Home Guard, the village's 'Dad's Army'. The other link with this story came from a totally unexpected encounter in Prince of Wales Park quite recently. Having appealed for memories of the park, events, parties, games
