### THE FORTUNES OF MR FISH

Our October speaker, the Notts born and bred son of a miner, Martin Fish was the first male in his family since 1792 not to go down the pit. After leaving school he took a job with the local parks department so that he could learn as much as possible about all aspects of horticulture.

Martin then took a full-time course at college and after graduation became at 21 the country's youngest head gardener at Rufford Abbey, the 1500-acre country estate of Lord Savile. The grounds had fallen into disrepair since a change of ownership in 1946 and Martin had to take on the enormous task of restoring and redeveloping the

#### New councillor needed for Lady Lane and Oakwood ward

A new councillor is needed to represent Lady Lane and Oakwood ward, following the resignation of Cllr Andrew Fenton (Con).

As there has been no petition requesting an election, the councillor will be co-opted by the Town Council. If you are interested in applying to be co-opted, please note the following:

Candidates are required to submit a written application, including a biography, reasons why they wish to become a Town Councillor and what they can offer to Bingley Town Council. Candidates will need to confirm in writing that they meet all of the eligibility tests. Details of the criteria, available on the Town Council website next week, or by contacting the Clerk. Candidates will be invited to one Town Council meeting before the meeting at which the co-option will take place. The co-option will be dealt with as an item of council business at an extraordinary meeting of the council yet to be arranged. The co-option procedure will also be available on the Town Council website from next week.

landscape of formal gardens and arboretum. Time moved on and Martin had saved enough to buy six acres of cheap land near Southwell and then install some second-hand glasshouses. At that time the local council decided to outsource bedding plants and other horticultural supplies. Using his established connections with the local authority, Martin stepped into the breach and was able to grow his own business as a supplier.

Readers who think that all these activities were sufficient for our hero are very much mistaken, for this was the time that Martin broke into journalism via Garden News, his favourite weekly read.

With an "I can do that" attitude he submitted an article, which was accepted by the publication, as were subsequent seasonal tips and hints. After 25 years he is still a regular contributor.

A chance meeting with John Sterling, Radio Nottingham's resident garden expert then led to regular 10-minute broadcasts on Fridays. Horticulture is an activity where all the experts know each other and meet regularly on the same show circuit ..... Chelsea, Harrogate, Tatton Park and so on.

At this time Martin was approached by Calendar to do a short gardening spot and this led to more regular TV work including constructing a demonstration plot in his own garden where he could show viewers how to achieve success in their own horti projects.

Bingley Town Council for action on the derelict site. To make it safe, the Annex has been scaffolded by the new owners who plan to demolish it and build houses on the site.

Last year, Bradford Council revealed the Annex was beyond economic repair and had to be demolished. Bradford then committed resources to deal with issues around a covenant restricting the building's use and it was put up for sale. According to the covenant, the proceeds of the sale must be used for the 'educational benefit of the people of Bingley' and Bradford Council has promised to consult on how this will be best achieved. The founders' stone and a time capsule, buried in the foundations, will also be kept. It is understood that the new owners, an offshoot of Padd Ltd, plan to scaffold the building to make it safe and then look to build houses on the site.

#### **Parking & Parking Charges**

Members of the public have raised concerns about parking outside schools, especially at Bingley Grammar School. Clearly more Wardens are required to manage these areas. Bingley Council to write to Bradford expressing our concerns. We will also be raising concerns about the implementation of evening parking charges in Bingley. Beware if you park on the car parks in Bingley you are now required to pay and display a £1 ticket. Wardens are patrolling the area.

As part of its ongoing project to improve Bingley's Christmas lights, the Town Council this year launched a competition for local primary schools to design a new custommade light for the town. The winner of the first Christmas Lights competition is Jasmine Stross, aged 8, from Eldwick Primary school.

Jasmine's winning design will be created in lights and hung on a lamp post at the corner of the market square. She will also be invited to join the celebrity at the Christmas Lights Switch-on which takes place on Saturday 24th November alongside the Christmas Fayre.

## LET THERE BE LIGHT!

Recent research through local newspaper 'scrap books' gave an illuminating story – forgive the pun. Electricity first came to Bingley to power the 1914 tramway, thanks to a supply drawn from Keighley when a substation was set up at the 19th century Bingley gas works. Ten years later a new electricity sub-station was built behind the original Bingley Post office on Main Street and by 1932 showrooms had opened for electrical appliances. Leonard Dyer's shop, opposite the Station House, was offering the 'Complete Radio Service' and was the appointed dealer for 'His Master's Voice'.

Under nationalisation, in 1945 the town lost its electricity and gas undertakings works. The electricity works, never more than a sub-station came under the Yorkshire Electricity Board. Whilst the town and its immediate village suburbs entered the new 'Electrical Age', it was not so for those parts of outlying Eldwick, which had to wait another 20 years.

So it was that on Wednesday 30th September 1953 that the lights for the High Eldwick, Drake Hill and Low Springs districts were connected to the electrical supply, officially switched on by Mr. Geoffrey Hirst M.P. 'A Grand, Glorious and Memorable' occasion was marked when, Mr Hirst pressed down the switch outside Dick Hudson's. The famous hostelry and its surrounding countryside came to know the advantages of electricity for the first time. As a special treat, the Yorkshire Electricity Board bathed Dick Hudson's in dazzling floodlighting which made it an even more prominent landmark for miles around.

At the time, Mr Fred Adcock of Knapley Ing farm at High Eldwick was present at the celebration tea which followed the official switch on. He remarked that his 400 year old house had once been lighted by candles, oil and, latterly, calor gas. Further, he could now return to his house, built in the 42nd year of the reign of Queen Elizabeth I, and enjoy the advantages of electricity for the first time. Today, Mrs Jowett of Dunnock Farm in





Heights Lane can confirm, having been brought up at Knapley Ing, how nice it was to get rid of the gas mantle lighting.

Tributes were paid at the ceremony to the men who had been involved in that major project, proving to have been far more difficult than had been thought. Mr Dennis Bellamy, chairman of Y.E.B., said the Board was as anxious to supply electricity as the people were to take it. Laughter resulted when he said there was not simply a move to make a big profit, since the Y.E.B. supply was the cheapest in the country apart from South Wales. Mr Hirst stressed how electricity would improve productivity, notably to increase output of home grown food. It was said that of the 1,700 farms in the country at the time, only 56 per cent had electricity, a figure to which the Eldwick farms could be added.

The scheme had encountered some problems, notably in groundworks around the bore hole at Birch Close Farm. That source for local water supply had been instigated in 1885 with some controversy. The Shipley Water Board was responsible for Eldwick's water supply as well as Shipley itself. A complaint was raised against the Baildon Water Board which had been given permission to create the borehole, whose water could have flowed naturally into both the Glovershaw and Eldwick Becks, at the same time depriving Shipley.

Returning to the electricity supply, it was stated that, for a cost of £15,000, with nine miles of cable having been laid, it was remarkable that it was all for the benefit of a mere 68 consumers!

Earlier in 1953 there had been a very different ceremony in Eldwick. Before the village's summer Gala took its present form it had been the Eldwick Sheep Dog Trials which reflected Eldwick's farming legacy of the time. So, 1953 being Coronation year of Queen Elizabeth II, it was fitting to crown an Eldwick Queen. On the Saturday at the Trial Field there was 'a colourful little ceremony'. At two o'clock the trials were halted as the crowd settled down to await the arrival of the

queen and her retinue. None other than Mr. Geoffrey Hirst M.P. was to crown 16 year old Miss Muriel Spencer as the queen. The description of the procession gives a clue to the location of the Trials Field since the route was along Otley Road and into Warren Lane. The queen and her retinue sat on a bedecked wagon drawn by a white horse resplendent in red, white and blue plumes. Miss Spencer was attended by Julie Yates, Heather Longbottom, Diane Coles, Judith Hodgson, Dorothy Driver and her page was Sarah Boston. Of course, 'Mister Eldwick', Mr.W.A.Birch, chairman of the Eldwick Coronation Gala Committee, presided and said it was a very proud moment for Eldwick for he believed this was the first occasion on which Eldwick had had a gala queen.

Eldwick's eldest lady, the queen's grandmother, aged 80, Mrs J.A.Spencer was presented with a bouquet. The following year, Heather Longbottom, having been an attendant in 1953, became the second gala queen in 1954. Memories of these events most welcome! Allan Mirfield
