PAT'S PLANTS PROVE POPULAR

Last year Pat Inman impressed us as a knowledgeable member of our Gardeners' Question Time panel and in February she



returned to make a solo appearance. On occasion she described her choices "Good Garden οf Plants" and was supported by a superb selection of slides and audience handouts listing the Latin names of nearly 40 different species. For over an

hour Pat showed us pictures of her plants, told us why she had selected them, how she grew them, where they had originated and where we could obtain them. She took our audience on a worldwide journey from Asters in America to Impatiens in China via Melianthus from South Africa and included

stop-offs in Sicily, Japan and Sardinia. Thanks, Pat, we all really enjoyed this world tour and came away with lots of ideas to add to our own gardens.

SOME TIPS FOR MARCH

Ventilate your greenhouse and cold frames in warmer weather and in cold weather use an electric propagator to encourage early sowings to better germination.

Still in the greenhouse (heated if necessary), start sowing bedding plant seeds to go out after the last frosts; repot orchids and other house plants before they start to grow again; pot on rooted cuttings of perennials taken last summer; sow tomato seeds and bring strawberries under cover for an earlier crop; warm up bags of compost for a week or two before sowing.

Plant fruit trees in a sunny, sheltered spot. Cut last season's autumn raspberry canes to ground level and cut the tips of any summer raspberry canes which have grown higher than their supports (cut just above a bud). Use cloches for strawberries, carrots, radishes and lettuce if planting outdoors.

Plant asparagus beds from crowns. Weed and mulch existing asparagus beds (weed by hand to avoid damaging the shallow asparagus roots), dig a trench 20 – 25 cms deep by 30 cms wide with a layer of well-rotted compost along the base, mixed with 85gr/sq.cm. of fish, blood and bone or bonemeal. The crowns should be 45 cms apart with the roots spread out and covered with sieved soil which just covers the emerging buds.

If the soil is not frozen or waterlogged you can plant sets of onions, shallots and garlic. Otherwise sow the sets in individual pots for transplanting when conditions are suitable.

Come and join us in the Memorial Hall on Tuesday 16 April to hear Dianne Nicol-Brown tell us all about the National Plant Collections of Polemoniaceae, Fragaria vesca and Hakonechloa. (It's a lorra lorra Latin, but you'll know them when you see them).

PARTY IN THE PARK 1869 to 2019

FROM BLEATHERHEADS TO TEDDYBEARS

Prince of Wales Park, thanks to 19th century quarrying which had ceased before 1861 was, as a result, endowed with a natural Arena, once described as, 'an Ariana capable of holding thousands of persons.' This was partially proved in 2015 when the 150th anniversary of the park was celebrated with a gala and an estimated 1000 people crowded in.

The Bleatherhead Band was formed in Baildon in 1857. Its principal purpose was to lead carnival and feast day parades, in colourful and comic dress, whilst playing an assortment of objects, some of which could be described as musical instruments. All over the country in that era there were other such bands, mainly epitomised by dress and parody. At the opening of Prince of Wales Park there was a typical display by the Bleatherheads, having marched all the way up from Bingley, fuelled with strength from the town's many alehouses. The pride of place in the parade was taken by a carriage in which figures likened to the Prince of Wales and his wife Princess Alexandra, waved royally to the assembled crowds. The Bingley Feast took place every August in various parts of the town and of course the park was used for concerts, sports and games on those occasions.

Having taken up the mantle of organising such events, the Friends of Prince of Wales Park are following, 150 years later, with TEDDYMANIA PROMOTED BY THE BINGLEY CHAMBER OF COMMERCE on Sunday 14th July 2019.

Returning to the subject of the Bleatherheads, there are newspaper articles and even chapters in books which fully describe their appearances performances. One book in particular was written by an author who always used a quirky style in disguising place names. So, for instance, Woolborough was used for Bradford, Bington for Bingley, and Prince Albert Park instead of Prince of Wales Park in a description of a Bleatherheads party in the park. James Burnley, in his book called West Riding Sketches, published in 1875 was one who included the chapter recalling that party. First he describes Bington itself as having the main street 'the High Road on which the High Flyer and Rockingham coaches were accustomed to travel.' Entering the town from Woolborough, 'the large smoke-hued densely populated town' there were ancient hostelries, one of which could have been like the White Horse because they had 'crumbling walls dressed up with plaster and white paint." Opposite the 'new' Mechanics Institute was a

large mansion converted into a bank and the principal hotel stood above the lane leading down to the railway station. The valley was heavily wooded on one side and moorland on the other - Gilstead Moor as was? There were already 'palatial mansions' dotted around which contrasted with the homes of those who were drawn to Bington 'to assist the steam god filling the world with new garments'. But in the summer everyone looked forward to the arrival of the Bleatherhead Carnival. Bleatherhead, in Yorkshire terminology, meant empty headed or 'noodle' and Bleather was Yorkshire for bladder, hence Bleatherhead. At the start of the carnival the crowds thronged the main street in front of one pub, The George and Dragon whose upstairs windows were filled with mysterious figures, Chinese, Hottentot, Patagonian, Red and Black Indian, the male and female Bleatherheads in customary dress. Nearby, posted on the ancient Buttercross and Market Hall, on stable and barn doors were placards, announcing that Grand Annual Festival of Bleatherheads would be held that afternoon in the Royal Albert Park. The costumed procession set off at 3 o'clock to a combination of sounds, fife, serpentine brass, cornets, penny trumpets, cans, pots and frying pans. Two 'coal cart' horses carried the King and Queen of the Bleatherheads. Up the steep hill they went to arrive at the Park - 'a barren tract of enclosed moorland and on the level plateau they pitched their tents.' Was this today's Arena or the Heath? Fires were lit, soup put on the boil, gingerbread and pie stalls opened and the banquet began. After that came the entertainment with the band playing and featuring 'two enormous guitars labelled Thorne's Trinidad Cocoa, and Colman's Mustard, a frying pan solo, all eclipsed by the dancing. Sir Roger danced with Azucena, Ivanhoe with Meg Merrilies, the Scotch Highlander with an Ancient Druid. The King and Queen danced together, refusing to be separated. Dancing and drinking until sundown, the procession reforms and returns to the Dog and Dragon 'to see the night out and the Bington Carnival is at an end for another year'. We still have a Carnival Queen but no King.

The Friends of Prince of Wales Park, its small committee and additional volunteers have made a programme of events through each year since 2013, as well as guided walks, but the highlights have been the summer events of 2015 and 2017. By popular demand and thanks to support from many local organisations and promoted by Bingley Chamber of Commerce, there will be

TEDDYMANIA. Fun and Games, Music, Food and Drink and even a Teddy Trail will be there for everyone. So be there with your Teddy Bear or adults may once again be a Teddy Boy or Teddy Girl!
