COUNCIL NEWS

Following our last full council meeting (September), the council agreed to continue the Saturday monthly Markets in the Town Square. We are working with Otley Town Partnership who operate the market on our behalf. On average we have between 14/17 regular stalls. The Markets will run from February to December 2020.We look forward to the continued support from residents of Eldwick in helping make the market a success. We have been in dialogue with Friends of Bingley Pool; they will shortly be signing the CAT (Community Assets Transfer) agreement with Bradford. BTC are looking at ways in which we can support them with possibly an annual grant or in the longer term take space in the building for additional offices/storage of Council equipment.

Meetings have taken place between BTC and Bradford to discuss the ongoing situation regarding the Bingley Music Live event. Bradford have made continuous losses on running the event, hence the lack of interest in continuing with the event. They have given Bingley Chamber of Trade £20k to support local events they promote. At the last minute, Bradford and Bingley Rugby Club in conjunction with the promotor for BML ran a much-scaled down event. The Rugby Club have taken the initiative and are running the event next year (2020). Our dialogue with Bradford continues, as we believe they should support and promote local events in Bingley.

At last, we are to have a Puffin Crossing installed outside the Library between there and the Co-Op car park. Getting a date from the council for the work to commence is difficult, had various dates given but it should be installed before Christmas.

Make a note in your diaries for the **Christmas Fayre and Light switch on 30th November.** All the stalls are let both on the Market Square and in the Arts Centre. Bring your children and grandchildren to see Santa; they can enjoy the rides provided by Bingley Chamber of Trade. The lights switched on at about 4.30pm. Celebrity to do the honours will be announced shortly.

ANTICS AT THE ACORN INN

Eldwick's village inn has survived more years than could be expected as the village, if it can still be called that, spread way beyond its location. Lying at the centre of the 18th century collection of hamlet dwellings, simply known as Eldwick Beck, the hostelry was first just a beer house - The Acorn. Perhaps its name relates to the ancient property of Eldwick Hall having stone carved acorns on its roof. Despite the fact that the population of Eldwick Beck was minimal in 1800, perhaps the building of the four storey Eldwick Beck Spinning Mill, was one reason why a second beer house was opened.

In 1841 William Green was at the Acorn, a relation of Thomas Green who built the mill in 1800. William Green Wood in 1841 was at the second beerhouse as keeper and grocer in one of the cottages opposite Eldwick Beck Chapel in Otley Road. In 1874 legislation allowed beerhouses to become fully licensed as inns. Six years later William Green Wood had somehow moved to run the Acorn to be followed by his son Titus some years later.

In 1873 the Shipley Local Board bought the mill to control water rights, for £5,500 and enquiries were to be made at The Acorn regarding the sale of the gas plant from the mill. On two occasions The Acorn's publicans were in court. First, in1886, before Mr Titus Salt and Lieut-Colonel W.Busfeild at the Magistrates Court, William Green Wood was charged with allowing drinking in his inn beyond permitted hours. Four drinkers were all mill hands from Saltaire and they claimed they had come from Bradford and arrived after hours. William claimed he knew not of where they had come from so he was not fined! However, each man was fined one shilling plus costs or seven days in prison!

In 1898, by which time Titus Green Wood, was in charge, Henry Fairbank, a respected landowner and farmer of Warren Park Farm in Warren Lane, was fined ten shillings for being drunk yet not fined for being Titus was responsible. The Shipley Board built reservoirs in the valley above the Acorn, for their own township, not for Eldwick and made frequent visits to inspect the installations, after which members of the committee retired 'for a splendid tea served at the Acorn'. In 1881 another

William Green Wood was living beyond the Acorn in New Row, eleven cottages beside the Water Mill, and he later became the water bailiff for 35 years for Shipley Waterworks, living at Reservoir House along the road from Dick Hudson's. Was it a quirk of fate or a connection family that brought Shipley Waterworks Board members to conclude visits to the reservoir 'with a splendid meal at the Acorn?' In May 1917 the Shipley


Education Association enjoyed summer Saturday trip to the Shipley Waterworks reservoir above Eldwick. They looked at the underground systems collecting moorland water which was then conveyed by gravity to both the reservoir at Baildon Bank and to the Weecher reservoir near Dick Hudson's. William Green Wood was a leaders, as water bailiff, and, after the party had examined the filtering and cleaning systems, he led them down to the Acorn. A most welcome tea was kindly provided by the staff, which was paid for by the Shipley Council. The chairman of the branch of the WEA said that, during the day the party of workers and officials had seen water under the ground, on the ground and, as a result of showery weather, they had felt it above the ground. Special thanks were given to William and to the staff at the Acorn who had been able to accommodate the group in the club room on the upper floor, as well as in the bar. The entrance to the upper floor was by a separate door (now the fire escape) and can be seen pictured far left where two ladies, presumably staff, are standing under a rather elaborate porch. The club room was used by members of The 25 Club the wealthy business residents of Eldwick's villas in Glen Road and Prospect Road. The sign above the main entrance of the Acorn shows James Lee was the publican, having succeeded Titus Green Wood by 1917. Titus in 1901 was boarding at the Acorn, later living at Rylston House in Saltaire Road, Eldwick, where he lived until his death in 1930 aged 77.

Turning to rural and local sports, there were newspaper adverts in 1893 of attractions to which locals would flock, held at the Acorn and which would not have pleased the League of Cruel Sports today. In March of 1893 there was published notice of a Rabbit Sweep for Airedale and Working Terriers. Long tails 9 yards back, 18 inches scratch and 3 yards per inch - presumably a handicap for the dogs. At 2pm, one and sixpence entry, £1 added. Plenty of rabbits. No Gambling Another notice featured a Rabbit Coursing Match between Briggs and Watmough's Glass Alley at 2pm. The best out of 15. £10 a side. Even Jack White, Eldwick's famous huntsman, would be at the Acorn with the Airedale Beagles and when he retired in 1983, after 38 seasons he could not recall how many hares had been caught. The Acorn Antics today are led by glittery jacketed Adam on Quiz Nights!



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
