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COUNCIL NEWS

Budget and precept for 2020-2021

Following consideration of a number of drafts at both committee and full council level, the council set its budget for the 2020/21 financial year at the full council meeting on 21 January. The monthly meeting was held earlier than usual in order to meet Bradford Council's budget reporting deadline. Anticipated expenditure in the year is £259,150, and the precept for the year for a Band D property will be £20.13. This is an increase of 0.6% on last year's equivalent figure of £20.00.

Appointment of Environmental Warden

Lee Matthews starts his new role as part-time Environmental Warden on 3 February. Lee will be working 20 hours a week on a variety of environmental tasks, supporting supplementing the work of Bradford Council's Parks and Street Cleansing staff and ensuring that Bingley is kept clean and tidy. His actually weekly hours are likely to vary over the year to accommodate seasonal changes, e.g. the need for snicket clearance in the summer.

An initial induction period will see Lee getting an introduction to the various wards of the parish and any particular areas of concern and also undergoing training, some of which will be provided by Bradford Council. Lee will be working closely with Bradford Council's wardens and with community groups looking after our parks and managing planting projects.

Tourism

Councillors have been working with both Bradford Council tourism staff and the Canal and River Trust to promote tourism in Bingley. Specific measures include pavement markers between Bingley railway station and the canal being designed and paid for by the C&RT.

It has been noted that the brown tourism signs pointing to the 5-Rise locks and a non-existent water bus are cluttering and often misleading. Councillors have requested that these be taken down, but Bradford Council does not have a record of where all the brown signs are. The Town Council has agreed to survey the brown signs and identify some to be removed.

Grit bins

The council have installed ten new grit bins at new locations around the Parish. Locations are assessed and agreed in consultation with Bradford Council and their usage is monitored. Please contact enquiries@bingleytowncouncil.gov.uk if you identify an area which you think needs a bin for next year. Let's hope that we don't need them too much this winter.

Green and Clean

The year's first Green and Clean Forum was held on 18 January, when topics under discussion included a new air quality (anti idling) campaign involving the district's schools. The success of the initial year of the Incredible Edible Bingley project was noted, and the organisers - Bingley WI's 'Bingley Bloomers', Action Stations and Gilstead Village Society - were keen to extend the scheme to various unloved patches of land about the town. The meeting also divided into groups to discuss suitable areas for tree planting.



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The area of wildflower planting on the junction of Ferncliffe Road and the slip road to the relief road will be maintained and enhanced this year, and Carlton Nurseries will again be providing summer flowers for all the council's baskets and tubs.

Dates for litter picks in 2020 are 8 February, 14 March, 20 June, 8 August, 10 October, 10 November. Public toilets and office project

The revised tenders for the conversion of the toilet block in Jubilee Gardens have now been fully reviewed and compared by the Town Council's project managers, Bowman Riley and the council's project steering group.

At the full council meeting on 21 January, the Council agreed in principle to appoint Building Projects Group to undertake the project. Some final adjustments to the specification are still needed, after which the contract with the successful tenderer will be put before the full council for approval and signing.

The Town Council is still waiting for a response from Bradford Council as to whether they are prepared to undertake the necessary electrical work at the pool to enable the installation of a Changing Places facility. The Council has allocated £12,000 for this piece of work.

Street furniture

For two years, the Town Council has been working to enhance the town centre with a project looking to paint the street furniture black, as a replacement to the current tired-looking blue colour. This was seen as one of the top twelve priorities by those of you who took part in the consultation exercise in September last year.

Residents will have noted that the new street furniture resulting from the Lidl development is already black. Negotiations with Bradford Council are being concluded and a decision is expected shortly.

Monthly markets

Markets have been a consistent priority for residents even before the council came into existence. The monthly markets that the Town Council has been providing for the past two years restart on Saturday 1 February. This year, the Council will be running markets every month except January and the opening hours have been changed to 10 am to 2 pm.

There will be the usual mixture of stalls providing hot and cold food, artisan crafts and entertainment by local musicians and artists some old favourites and some new faces. We hope you'll come and support your local market!

Play in the Park summer 2020

Following the success of the free Play in the Park sessions for primary school-aged children in the past two years - four in 2018 and six in 2019 - the Council has now confirmed it will fund a further six events in the 2020 school summer holidays:

Friday 24 July – Eldwick Rec Friday 31 July – Cottingley Rec Saturday 1 August - Myrtle Park Friday 7 August - Gilstead Rec Friday 14 August - Crossflatts Rec Friday 21 August - Myrtle Park

Bradford Council organises and runs these events with their own staff and using their own insurance. The Town Council is also providing toilets, including a mobile Changing Places facility at one of the sessions.

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TITHE OR TOLL

There are several significant dates in the history of Eldwick, twinned with the representation of the name, being it Helguic in Domesday I 1086, Helewike in 1273, Helwick in 1773 and so on. After that there are details in inquisitions and deeds which bear the name of the village. Obviously the name is clarified by the time of the 1841 Census which gives bare details of people and locations.

The first Ordnance Survey map was surveyed in 1847 and published in 1851. Sadly for the then centre of Eldwick ('Beck Bottom') a large letter Y of Bingley hides detail. Thus it is fortunate that the 1845 Tithe Map for Bingley and Micklethwaite gives far more detail than ever before. The map itself stretches across the Bingley Parish, as shown on last month's map. Accompanying the map is the 'apportionment ledger' which lists every owner of land, current occupiers, acreage, numerical references to the map and rent charges due. Until 1836 tithes were paid in kind but by the time of this award, simple rent charges became adopted. The handwritten ledger includes houses, cottages, shops, foundries. And in case of central Bingley, all the inns which still exist today, albeit renamed, as well as beer houses interspersed along Main Street, just like today.

One link with Eldwick is the wealthy Tolson family since it was the sisters Ann and Agnes who, after public subscription, sold 8 acres of land which neighboured the 10 acres awarded to the poor, to create Prince of Wales Park. In fact Richard Tolson negotiated on behalf of the Ferrands, Busfeilds et al, as their solicitor, to agree a tithe award payment to the Vicar of £300. Bear in mind the 'vicarage' was the mansion like structure in Park Road, todays Monk Barn where the Vicar lived rent free. The total area on the map was 5,500 acres, much of it common or waste since Rumbolds Moor was 1460 acres, Gilstead Moor 410 acres and 'ancient enclosures 3368 acres. The Bingley Parish rent charges yielded £710/3/5p including Harden, Morton and Micklethwaite.

In detail the rent charges from Eldwick's farms were in huge contrast to those of the major landowners. So, Joseph Baldwin at his 8 acre Eldwick Corn Mill farm paid, 8 shillings, David Jowett at Faweather's 28 acres paid £1/4/4d, David Binns at Cropper Fold of 42 acres paid £1/16/8d. Compare those figures with those of George Lane Fox of Bramham with farms at Gawthorpe, Priestthorpe, Warren Hiuse, Crow Nest, Mill Gate, Toad Lane (lower Park Road), Gilstead Moor and Canalside – 1673 acres paying £52/7/6d, Sarah Ferrand with 1076 acres paid £46/7/6d and William Busfeild of Upwood. East and West Morton, 953 acres paid £41/2/-. Prior to the rent charges the payment in kind was for example 1p for every foal, 1p for every swarm of bees, 1p for every householder instead of tithes on eggs and poultry, other than geese, ten shillings for



every mill. In a year the arable farmers, who at that time were in a majority, had wheat valued at seven shillings and a farthing per bushel(674 bushels registered), barley three and eleven pence hapenny per bushel (1196) and oats two and ninepence (1721).

In terms of reference to property there was again a variety of entries. John Skirrow, tenant of the Crompton Stansfields at Eldwick Hall had house, barn, yard, stable, garden and nursery, Map extract pictured. Admiral Duncombe who was the owner of the Elizabethan mansion the Salt family chose to demolish to build Milnerfield, had house, coach house, stables, yard, garden, nursery, orchard, plantation and wood. David Wildman at Eldwick Crag had a house and three cottages in his 11 acres. John Rhodes of Heights and Tewet owned a house five cottages and a plantation. Many others just had a cottage and garden or croft. Field names give clues to other places. The Sheriff Lane farm has a field named Rawson Royds after the subterranean watercourse which still runs the length of the lane called Rawson Dyke. The farm within what was Gilstead Moor has several fields named Little Warrens, hence Warren Lane. There is also a Sheariff Field and near Eldwick Hall is Little Eldwick Close. But what gave a name to Shroggs or the Dock Pits?

It remains to be seen whether the field system of 1845 remains although I remember
