Although the building has been quiet over these past months, The Eldwick Church has not been asleep!

Early in lockdown, we set up the prayer field on the Church lawn. Many people said that they had received great comfort from 'planting' the crafted blooms or sitting quietly in the garden. We have been touched by so many folk who contacted us with poignant stories; some being unable to attend the funeral of a loved one due to restrictions. Churches further away also contacted us about our idea and prayer gardens have appeared in parishes from North Yorkshire to Devon.

In May, we embarked on a steep learning curve to produce our 'magazine-style' weekly online services which are posted on YouTube and Facebook. Who would have thought at the start of 2020 that your local church would have its own YouTube Channel! There have been memorable contributions from guest speakers and interviewees – including a very early appearance from Nigel at Eldwick Post Office. Many thanks Nigel, for helping us kick off this new initiative which has offered a different and accessible way of being in Church during the pandemic.

Rev Peter Mayo-Smith retired at the end of July. We streamed his last service on 2nd August: you can still view this on YouTube or on our Facebook page. We are so grateful for Peter's three years of ministry with us and wish him and Eileen a happy retirement when they move to their new home in North Wales. We are waiting until more of us can gather together to present our gift to them. (We will definitely do this before they move, even if it has to be outside!)

We were delighted to see the Villages Pre School reopen in July – albeit with reduced numbers. Thanks to Jane and all the hard work she puts into ensure that the children can attend safely. Jane comments, "Having re-opened in June 2020 with reduced days

and staff team, it is now lovely to be back Monday - Friday and operating under our 'new normal' guidance. The children have settled amazingly well, which is a tribute to their families, the children themselves and our team of practitioners at pre-school. We have missed the smiles, laughter, cuddles, and sense of fun that young children bring with them to pre-school, so thank you for making us feel 'complete' once more!"

Going forward, we plan to continue our online services which premiere each Sunday morning at 10.30, or at a convenient time thereafter.

You can now attend services in person (also at 10.30 am) but we are limited to a congregation of 25. 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ELDWICK'S MILNERFIELD

THE WARREN PARK ESTATE

In Warren Lane the Warren Farm was on the west side of the lane, stretching back to Gilstead Moor Edge. It had a second access from Park Road and its fields occupied the whole of the late 1950s Heaton estate. It was the construction of Clarendon Road which eventually caused the late 18th century farmhouse to be demolished.

On the east side of the road, almost opposite Warren Farm, the Warren Park Estate was developed in 1862 as a gentleman's residence for William Gath, a worsted manufacturer. The single building on Warren Lane, bearing the date and his initials, always had the impression of being a lodge and has ornate exterior and interior features. To the north, the recently named Slate Quarry Lane, led to a house, coach house and stables. Conjecture has always been that the 'house' was just a farm house but an 1869 advert for sale by auction gives a different picture of a whole estate. The land was surrounded by stone walls and ornamental plantations. There was, on the west side, a substantial stone house with two sitting rooms, kitchen, scullery and servants' rooms on the ground floor. On the first floor there were four bedrooms and, in the basement, extensive cellars. The farm buildings on the east side comprised an enclosed yard with mistals for 16 head of cattle, stabling for three horses, coach house, cart sheds, piggeries, etc. The grounds had been laid out with flowering and evergreen shrubs as well as fruit trees. There was a never failing supply of spring water and an extensive range of glasshouses. On the 1893 OS map the symbol for glass is shown attached to the west end of the block of buildings and on an 1885 sale plan of adjacent land, a pond is shown at the opposite end.

The advert explains all was originally laid out by William Gath but suggests the site was eligible for a gentleman's residence in the centre of the estate. If that was the case it says 'the present residence, standing on the west side of the property would serve as a farm-house or lodge'. This is strange, because the small house on Warren Lane was obviously a lodge. Neither could it be a two storey four bedroom house. William Gath had a large family who would have lived in the main house. He left his wife and family in 1866 after being made bankrupt and divorced, fleeing to South America where he soon

remarried.

The 1869 wording says the house and gardens were occupied by Mr J. Wilson Smith and the agricultural land and buildings by Mr Skirrow. At that time Mr Wilson was renting Castle-fields Mill in Bingley but also was a partner of another company which owned a mill in East Morton. That company failed which is presumably why the Warren Park Estate was for sale.

In the 1871 Census the estate was occupied by Benson Varley, aged only 28, described as a designer in the textile trade and he later became a mill owner. In the house the family comprised his 26 year old wife, four children aged between 7 years and a three week old and a nurse. From 1877 the estate had James Fairbank, a coal merchant from Allerton, whose relation, Henry, was farming at Drake Hill in Heights Lane, Eldwick so is that why James arrived nearby?

By 1881 James was at both Warren Park and Heights, presumably Drake Hill, farming 170 acres at Warren Park. Ten years later he was a gentleman farmer and it was said he bought land in West, North and East ridings so he lived at Appleton Manor in Appleton Le Street near Malton. Yet in 1894 when a daughter married, it was stated James, her father, was 'of Appleton Le Street and Warren Park'. As a widower in 1901 he was listed in the census as farmer and colliery owner, the latter probably his source of wealth. The Fairbank family in Allerton lived at Allerton Grange and had long been in the coal business. When he died in 1903 he had 'considerable estates' leaving £50,000 in his will and was buried in Bingley Cemetery. James had also been a Bradford Councillor and was a partner in Henry Briggs brick makers. Arabella Fairbank married into the Briggs family, which eventually took the story into the 20th century. Arthur Briggs, presumably as landowner, used to come to see his Warren Park estate, some of which was rented by

the Robinson family of Gilstead Lane End Farm. The late Mrs Robinson told of this gentleman, arriving on the bus, smartly dressed in suit with gold watch and chain, to take tea with her.

In 2000 the Warren Park Estate came on the market with Dolittle and Dalley of Kidderminster as agents. Contact was made, after Mrs Robinson had said one of the trustees of the estate was a member of the Fairbank family and had a London address? Sadly the company replied, only saying the trustees had no wish to engage with information. At some point the estate was sold off, the tiny 'lodge' and the Slate Quarry Lane buildings converted into three dwellings. Also the land north and south of the buildings was first sold for the construction of the Gilstead Middle School, (now Eldwick Primary School), and, subsequently for the huge development of the Swan Avenue housing estate in 2004. So the Fairbank/Briggs Trust would have accumulated considerable wealth, benefitting both James and Arthur.
