BACK TO SCHOOL?

May we hope that the new term, the first of 2022 can bring more of a normal return to schooldays in the light of recent disruptions due to the pandemic, causing isolations and even closures for some classes? Although not quite as serious as the virus which has prevailed, the log books of the Eldwick Board School record a whole host of absences, varving from illnesses to severe weather. There were schools in the Eldwick vicinity which predated the establishment of the Eldwick Board School in 1877, that in the High Eldwick Chapel of 1815 and the Eldwick Beck Methodist Schoolroom of 1832. A very different kind of school had been erected in 1874 at High Eldwick when a new schoolroom was built for the benefit of workmen and children connected with the reservoir works. It was purely for a minister to conduct religious services each Sunday in the first instance but developed later thanks to donations of 'the gratuitous distribution of hymn books, periodicals and tracts'. Were the navvies and children well versed and educated to such an extent as to enjoy such?

The Eldwick Board School, financed by their Lordships of the Education Board in London, was managed by the Bingley School Board. Eldwick School cost £1,680 to build plus the teacher's house for £400. By 1880 the Bingley Board had built all the schools of the surrounding villages, costing £24,942 with 2160 scholars on roll. However the average attendance was only 1670 and was this because attendance was not compulsory by 1888? As has been recorded here before, the winter of 1881 brought severe hardship to Eldwick village with repercussions for the school. At that time the majority of pupils would have been living in the cottages of Eldwick Beck Bottom, the Brick Kiln Row (Park Top) or the New Row adjacent to the Corn Mill at the top of The Green. Beyond those locations were all the farms but were the families of the villa owners of Glen Road and Prospect Road patronising their local school?





So it was in the beginning that two large classrooms, only divided by a curtain, were constituted within the 1877 school building. The original plan shows Class I for younger children measured 36 feet by 22 feet, that for Class II 17 x 22. Two separate entrances to the building, a corridor outside the rooms, no facility for staff, outside toilets and a rough piece of land for a playground. Initially, pupils on roll in 1877 numbered 53, almost doubling to 104 by 1937 when the extra classroom was built as an extension to the rear of the building. In February 1908 the inspector came to call when there were 75 children registered, 43 in the Infant Class, by comparison the average attendance was 60 in total with 20 Infants. The comprehensive report tells how the new headmaster had brought improvements but 'standards may improve once the reticence of some of the children has been overcome'. Children read and write well, use oral comprehension, and oral arithmetic. For the Infants, some of the lessons are too long and elementary work 'is undesirable for children under five'. The premises report reminds that previous faults had not been corrected - nothing done to adapt the closets for infants and the playground is still rough.

Moving into the 1920s and beyond the log book entries by the head teacher often do dwell on the impact of both the weather and illnesses suffered by the children. At one time in 1927 there was a repeat of the smallpox epidemics of the previous century when the whole village had been seriously infected. On December 23rd of 1927, just days before Christmas - when school was still in session? 'Attendance has been very low during the past three weeks owing to smallpox and a

large number of children have been vaccinated'. Further entries in later years report 24 out of 70 pupils absent with measles, whooping cough and scarlet fever. As a result of the latter, the school was actually closed by the sanitary inspector. Worst still in 1936 when absences were caused due to diphtheria as well as measles. In 1938, after Mr Birch had taken up his post three years earlier, it was written that between September 1935 and November 1936 this three teacher school has had six head teachers and 5 Infants teachers'. Alec Birch of course served for many years.

It was not all doom and gloom, with a school closure when Princess Mary visited Bingley in 1927 to open the public baths, 4 days off for the Coronation of King George VI in 1937 with an historical tableau for the children in the new Myrtle Park. Wartime reports included the arrival of evacuees, 20 from London who did not depart until 1945. A special treat came in the following year when all the children received bags of sweets from the Australian people and then three large cases of apples, courtesy of the British Columbia Tree Fruits Ltd were shared at school. In 1953 everyone was presented with their Souvenir Coronation Cups. Have you still got yours? Archive photos are the 1925/26 tableau with teacher Miss Smailes and pupils, and of the 2001 Eldwick School Sale. Only some children have had names provided, such as Winnie Boocock, Phillis Eichel, John Andrew Heughan, Greenwood, Lily Murgatroyd, Grace Whiting, Edgar Greenwood, and Joan Varey. Any families now could add more names if they have that picture?


