

Otley Road, Eldwick

Dear Sir,

With regards to the photo of a car parked on the pavement of Otley Road I have never understood the reasoning of people who do this sort of selfish act. As well as forcing people with young children and prams to walk into the road to face speeding motorists, the driver is committing several criminal offences. First there is obstruction of the highway (which includes pavements). This carries a maximum fine of £1,000. Next in driving onto the pavement a further offence is committed carrying a maximum fine of £500, followed by the same offence again as they drive off. Even more selfish are those parents collecting from Eldwick School who think that if they park on the pavement the 'yellow lines' do not apply either. In fact they apply 'wall to wall'. carries another maximum fine of £1,000. These parents are then usually the ones who put their children at risk by driving off without seatbelts for themselves or their children (assuming one adult and two children that could be another £2,000). If people have that much money to risk I am sure that various village clubs and societies would welcome the money spent in their direction.

ELDWICK AND GILSTEAD HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY

Our meeting in May was about "container planting and hanging baskets" and the speaker was Mrs Patricia Taylor of Carlton Nurseries.

We were given a demonstration of how to plant up a hanging basket with Mrs Taylor talking us through the various steps and discussing the pros and cons of lining materials and compost. As watering is a key issue, Mrs Taylor suggested the use of waterretaining crystals in the compost and planning the planting so that plants such as lobelia, which are less droughtresistant, are at the base of the basket.

Slow-release food granules were suggested as the best idea to provide the plants with the appropriate nutrients. Dead-heading plants would prolong their flowering period and regular monitoring for pests and diseases was obviously important. By this time, we hope that your baskets are "blooming lovely!"

An additional 'meeting' was held in June this year, but instead of being in the Memorial Hall, members of the Society and of the local community, had a walk in the countryside to the north of the village hall. This was led by Les Barnett, President of the Bradford Urban Wildlife Group (BUWG) and a well-known, local botanist. We were favoured with a beautiful evening and approximately 40 people joined in this event, which covered many aspects of local and social history, geology, etc, as well as plant life. JUNE 1899 — Eldwick News — 100 Years Ago

On Sunday 2nd St. Lawrence's Church Sunday School held their Anniversary. The norning service was conducted by Rev. A.E. Mould, the Curate in charge of the Greengates parish. The evening service was taken by the Vicar Archdeacon Kilner. The soloists were A. Patrick and T.P. Tetley. The day's collection amounted to 24.12s.0d.

Leading up to his re-appointment, Mr Potter the Sanitary Inspector submitted his annual report for the year ending June 1899, to the Bingley District Council on Monday the 17th. That part of his report elated to Eldwick was as follows:—

Examined plans for new buildings = 5 nspections during the above work = 38 Complaints of Nuisance investigated = 1 Statutory Notices issued and enforced = 5

Emily Wood of Eldwick Beck, a pupil of Vir Lowther Hanson of Bingley, passed the ntermediate examination, held in Leeds, of he London College of Music, with Honours.

J. Cordingley of Eldwick, who plays cricket for Baildon Clarence, was at the end of June, second in the Shipley and District Junior league batting averages with 10 nnings; 3 not outs, most in innings amounted to 29 not out, with 102 runs, an average of 14.57.

Bingley School Board considered the ecent report of H.M. Inspector of Schools.

It would seem that they had taken no action on the Inspector's adverse report on the Eldwick School cloakrooms last year. However this year the Inspector was most critical and the Board appointed a subcommittee of Councillors Stephen Walbank, R. Garnett and A.F. Wood to report back with recommendations about the cloakrooms.

A glittering occasion in the form of a Cantata, performed by the pupils of the Eldwick Board School, entitled "The Fairies of the Season" took place on Saturday the The venue was the Ferrands mansion, Daisy Bank, Little Beck Lane, Gilstead, overlooking Bingley. members of the Bingley School Board were invited and most attended together with many local dignitaries. There were over 400 in the audience. At the end of the performance Mrs Ferrand presented each member of the cast with a large fancy box of chocolates. Mr Ferrand arranged for each family to receive a cabinet photograph of the cast which had been professionally taken earlier. The large cast, most of the school, read like a directory of Eldwick families and was as follows:-


