#### 12 CRIME PREVENTION TIPS TO LOOK AFTER YOUR PROPERTY

Always postcode your valuable property.

Always lock your doors even when you are at home.

Always ensure you have good quality door and window locks fitted.

Always make sure that your house looks as though someone is at home.

Always leave a light on at night-time when you are out. Consider a timeswitch.

Always use external lighting during the hours of

Always inform your neighbours when you are away from home

Always cancel your milk and newspapers when you are away from home.

Always consider having an intruder alarm installed.

#### **UPDATE ON BRADFORD'S** UNITARY DEVELOPMENT PLAN (UDP)

The Policy and Planning Department (Jacob's Well) will be reporting to the Executive Committee/Councillors on 27 March on the new policy and sites which form Bradford's second UDP.

Following this, the (Draft) Plan should be available by mid-May for the start of a 6week Public Consultation period. Shipley Area Plan will be available in local libraries and in the Planning Office at Shipley Town Hall. The Council also hopes to make these documents available on the Council Web Site.

The 'new' Plan will propose sites for various forms of development for the next 15 years and re-examine all of the district's Green Belt. The vast majority of sites from the 'old' Plan which have not yet been developed, will be included and can be looked at again. Objections can be based on material changes and any new legislation or Planning Guidance.

Following the consultation period, if objections are raised by the community or landowners, and these cannot be resolved. an Inquiry will follow.

## **ELDWICK & GILSTEAD HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY**


The January meeting was addressed by Graham Foster who talked about the "walls in the landscape of the Pennine uplands"

He informed the meeting how the rocks of the uplands - sandstone and limestone were formed millions of years ago and 'carried' by a delta moving south in the carboniferous period. In places, eg on the Craven Fault (approximately 2,000 feet), further land movement has 'lifted off' the sandstone cap, to leave the limestone exposed. We heard about ice to a depth of 5.000 feet and sea levels 330 feet below today's and how clay, mud and stones were deposited by glaciers

When 'man' began to settle in small communities, trees were chopped and burned and crops grown. Stone was removed from the land and used for walls in much the same way as it is today. were small and curvy, eg around Malham, where some walls are 3-4,000 years old. Walling really 'took off' in an organised way following the Enclosures Act. An example given was that of Gilstead Moor, which in 1858 was reclaimed and put back into agricultural production.

In the 1960s Mr Foster had found an arrowhead and a scraping flint on the Bryant/Redrow site in Warren Lane. He told

## FEBRUARY 1901 Eldwick News - 100 Years Ago

On Tuesday the 5th. Mr. J.R. Bruce of Eldwick was one of the musical entertainers at the Bingley Baptist School Concert held towards funds for "Lighting and Beautying the School".

Saturday the 9th saw polling taking place to elect a new Bingley School Board. East Ward voted at Eldwick Board School and Mornington Road Board School. There were 13 candidates for 9 seats. The candidates stated their allegiance as 6 Liberal, 4 Churchman, and 3 Independents.

Elected were:-

The Rev. F.W. Bardsley the Vicar of Holy Trinity who topped the poll with

2120 votes Jas. Hartley (Churchman) 1619 votes John Pollard (Liberal) 1563 votes Wm. C. Ferrand (Liberal) 1405 votes John Barron (Liberal) 1340 votes 1028 votes Rev. J. Martin (Liberal) A.F. Wood (Independent) 1019 votes A.M. Drake (Churchman) 961 votes Jas. Bedford (Independent) 907 votes

There were 3843 registered voters and 1649 voted. Mr. Stephen Walbank of Eldwick was amongst the 4 unsuccessful candidates.

The first meeting of the Board took place on Tuesday 19th., and the well known Eldwick personality William C. Ferrand of Daisy Bank, Gilstead was elected Chairman.

On Saturday 16th. in the National School, Bingley a sale of work was held with the object of raising funds towards reducing the debt on the new organ in St. Lawrence's Church, Eldwick. It was opened by Mrs. A.T. Parkinson of Bradford, the wife of the Principal of the firm of Armistead and Parkinson the designers of St. Lawrence's. The fancy goods stall was presided over by Mrs. Raistrick, Mrs. Royston, and Mrs.
